


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Dear Friends,

As summer surrounds us with warmth and familiar comforts, opportunities to spend our leisure time with family, friends and neighbours, I invite us, gently and urgently, to stretch our compassion beyond our parish boundaries. To see that the people suffering across the world are not strangers, but our global neighbours.

As you all know, in Gaza, life has become unspeakably hard. Hospitals have been bombed. Aid has been blocked. Hunger, trauma and fear are daily realities. Feroze Sidhwa, an American trauma surgeon volunteering there, said the horror he's witnessed surpasses even his experiences in Ukraine's war zones. "Doctors feel alone," he said. "They feel abandoned by the world."

The United Nations warns of a complete collapse of the healthcare system, if indeed it hasn't happened already. People have been shot while queuing for food. Medical workers are being denied entry. It is heart-breaking.

The situation in Gaza, Palestine and Israel is incredibly complex. Atrocities have been committed on all sides. Nothing in this letter justifies any act of terror or violence. This is not about politics. It is about people - those caught in suffering. Because when we begin to see our neighbours as disposable, or as enemies by default, all of humanity is diminished.

Jesus said, "Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." That was not a suggestion. It was a commandment of love.

We have been raising funds for Al Ahli Hospital in northern Gaza, a Christian hospital supported by the Diocese of Jerusalem. Since the war began, it has been bombed eight times. Still, it continues to serve anyone in need - Muslim, Christian, anyone - under fire, short of supplies, and against all odds. At our upcoming event, we hope to raise vital funds to support essential repairs, restocking of medical supplies, and the continued provision of life-saving care.

In a recent interview, Mirjana Spoljaric, President of the International Committee of the Red Cross, described Gaza as "hell on Earth." She warned: "We cannot continue to watch what is happening. It's surpassing any acceptable, legal, moral, and humane standard. The fact that we are watching a people entirely stripped of its human dignity - it should really shock our collective conscience."

So let us not stay silent. Let us speak, act, and pray.

Join us for a Morning of Support on Saturday, 19th July, 10am—1pm, at St. John's, Crossfield Road. Come and gather in solidarity. Donate. Buy cake. Support local and fairtrade goods. Offer your presence, and bring others. We hope this won't just be the Church standing up, but the whole community, united in compassion and resistance to the idea that anyone, anywhere, should suffer alone.

So touch.



LYCHGATE REPAIR

The St. Michael's Lychgate, which was damaged in a collision by a car in October 2024, is to be repaired starting the first week in July and will be completed by the end of August. The stonework and oak supports which were damaged and pushed out of place by the impact, will need to be repaired/replaced. Conversely, the roof is relatively new and is to be retained.

To carry out the repair, the roof will be jacked up on a scaffolding platform which will hold the weight of the slates and beams, while the damaged oak and stone are replaced below. This means that the Lychgate will be filled with structural scaffolding for the 4-6 week period of repair, and the only access to the church and graveyard will be via the adjacent stile. A portaloo will be hired and located close to the Lychgate for use by the contractors.

Please bear with us during the period of the repair and take care when using the stile. Due to the closure of the Lychgate, no funerals will be possible at St Michael's during July and August. Other services will go ahead as usual using the stile for access.

ST. MICHAEL'S CELEBRATION EVENT – HOLD THE DAY SUNDAY, 5th OCTOBER 2025, 11AM-4PM

The St. Michael's Church refurbishment project, which started in 2019, is now essentially complete. The structure is repaired, heating is installed and working, the kitchen and disabled toilet are fitted, and the majority of the reordering and redecoration is complete (with just a few areas of plaster which are still drying, prior to repainting over the next 6-12 months).

The Church Team would, therefore, like to formally thank all those who have helped along the way, and also want to welcome everyone from the locality into our new Community Space. We are honoured that Bishop Rob has agreed to lead a service of Thanksgiving at 3pm on Sunday, 5th October, and we will be having a Church Open Day from 11am-3pm that day.

Members of the community are welcome to drop in for refreshments during the day, and look round the church. Everyone is invited to attend the Service, if they wish. If it is standing room only, all the better. Details of the Open Day are still being finalised, but we expect it to include: a display of photographs showing before and after the refurbishment, a tribute to Benny Walker whose generosity made the refurbishment possible, tours of the church and tower, the opportunity to try bell-ringing, and sharing of ideas about how we intend to use the building as a community asset in the future.

GEORDIE RAMBLINGS

So, we are officially in our summer season!! I can remember the few very hot and warm days we have recently had, but as I sit and write this, we have just had lots of torrential rain, lightning and thunder (a normal Cumbrian summer?).

As I mentioned in my last rambling, I raised about my studies, I have just returned from Preston after a Formation Day with other LLMs and Ordinands, where we, as Licensed Lay Ministers, learnt about and discussed the whole day on being licensed to officiate at funerals. It was a long and challenging day and very enlightening on every aspect of different funeral services. The travel, as usual, was also very challenging making my time away from home just over 15 hours to be precise, it didn't help when Northern Rail sent me a text saying train from Preston to Barrow was cancelled!! I eventually made it home around 9.30pm via Carlisle.

It's just three more Tuesday evening sessions to go and two written assignments and year 1 is finally over. As I said in the last edition, my health has also been a challenge and, hopefully, I am very much on the upward slope and looking forward to the coming months ahead.

Did you know that it's been 1700 years (19th June), since The Nicene Creed was first agreed.

The Nicene Creed originally dates from the year 325 when it was agreed by the First Council of Nicaea. Part of the purpose of developing the creed was to give expression to the understanding of God as Trinity. This means that Christians believe in one God in three persons – Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Since 325, the creed has been modified, expanding particularly on the description of the Holy Spirit. Some of these modifications were not accepted by all churches and remain a point of disagreement between western and eastern churches.

The Nicene Creed is nevertheless the most widely accepted creed in the Christian faith, used by many denominations including the Anglican Communion. It is a reminder of the common faith we share – both with Christians around the world today and throughout history with all those who have affirmed these words over the last seventeen centuries, and we all say together during the relevant service.

The Church of England have recently produced many resources to celebrate this event, and I am exceptionally grateful they have, as one of our written assignments is on the original '325 AD Nicene Creed'. I am particularly enjoying reading and listening to the 'Everday Faith' App and being able to read and reference the numerous resources. These couldn't come at a more opportune time. Why not pay a visit to The Church of England website and see what is on offer for us all to access and use.

Thanks for reading, and apparently, we get a break now, before the next edition of 'The Crosslacon Herald' in September.
